Re: Application for an Industrial Ground Water Transfers Permit and  
Application for a Permit to Transfer Ground Water to Adjoining State

To Whom It May Concern:

I would like to have all applicable permits completed so that I may transfer groundwater for industrial and commercial purposes both in the State of Nebraska and outside of Nebraska. The main use of the water will be for oil exploration and possible wind turbine construction.

The specific locations as required on the applications are unknown at this time, as I do not know where the oil companies will be drilling new oil wells. I can provide this information for each sale in the future if needed. Also, the wind turbine facility is currently hearsay, but I would like to position myself to provide them water if the project does indeed materialize and at that time I could provide more accurate locations if needed. Also, I will not begin transferring any water until these permits are approved and the opportunity to transfer the water presents itself.


I have been transferring water to the oil field industry since 1955. I have an approved industrial baseline from the South Platte Natural Resources District (SPNRD) and all industrial water runs through flow meters dedicated for this industrial use. These meters are monitored monthly by the SPNRD.

Alternative sources of water for the oil exploration and wind turbine industries are probably available. However with an approved industrial baseline and my close proximity to the Colorado/Nebraska state line, convenience for these industries is why my wells appeal to them.

This transfer will have little to no effect on other ground water or surface water users. I have been using these wells for several years already and they have not harmed any of my neighbors. Also, this transfer should not have any adverse effects on the environment.
